

## A DAY WITH VISUAL ARTIST TOLLIVER LEWIS, JR.

#### "An Unsung Texas Treasure"

The Artis the Artist Foundation recently had the distinct pleasure of speaking with gifted visual artist Tolliver Lewis, Jr. at his home in Fort Worth, Texas. The timing of this divine appointment was at least 25 years past due. However, it perfectly aligns with the Foundation's goals of supporting young artists who are just starting or completing their college journey. Creating art or performing is the very lifeline and joy for many young artists. Creating art is something they are commissioned to do and not doing that negatively impacts the artists' very being.

Tolliver Jr. provides a rich tour of his unbelievable journey as a visual artist. His perseverance, mad art skills, and professionalism will be a testament to the Foundation's scholarship winners, college students, those who are just starting their careers as an artist, and anyone who loves art.

Tolliver's daughter, Debra Reed, invited me to Tolliver Jr.'s home studio where the magic happens!

The moment that my foot touched the floor of his home studio, I was overwhelmed with what I saw. There were hundreds of pieces of art, and each piece told a different story - and Tolliver was narrating them all. What makes his work extra special is the storytelling that is evident in every piece. I named this style "Tolliverism" ... and it cannot be duplicated!

So, who is Mr. Tolliver Lewis Jr.? He is a native of Dallas, Texas and a graduate of the renowned Booker T. Washington High School, now The Booker T. Washington High School for the Performing and Visual Arts. Tolliver Jr.'s talent began at the young age of four years old. His parents recognized his gift and encouraged him from the beginning. When he would run out of drawing paper, his mother would give him brown paper bags to continue to draw and create.

He also created many pieces for his family's home church, the historic Munger Avenue Baptist Church. When the church celebrated its 100-year anniversary, Tolliver Jr. created a historic painting commemorating the church's rich history. His work has also been exhibited in many galleries around the DFW metroplex including but not limited to The Ann Taylor Gallery, Firehouse Gallery, Eastside Library, Fort Worth Community Arts Center, University of Texas at Arlington, Art Space Fort Worth, Ray Smith Gallery, and the Fielder Gallery.

Tolliver Lewis, Jr. lives in Fort Worth, Texas with his wife of 60 plus years. They have one daughter, two sons, five adult grandsons, six great-grandsons, and one great-grand daughter. Mr. Tolliver Lewis, Jr. still paints and draws every day at the age of 80 plus! - Arlener Steels Poydras

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
